Potential Impact of These Directives on AU Research

Funding and Research Priorities Shift

- EO 14151 (Ending DEI Programs) & EO 14173 (Restoring Merit-Based Opportunity)
 - Research funding for projects tied to diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI)
 may be significantly reduced or eliminated.
 - Studies on systemic barriers in education, workplace bias, and social determinants of health may struggle to secure federal grants.
 - Institutions relying on federal DEI grants may need to pivot toward alternative funding sources or shift focus away from inclusivity-related research.
- EO 14169 (Reevaluating U.S. Foreign Aid)
 - International research collaborations may face increased scrutiny, particularly those involving global health, climate science, and policy research.
 - Funding reductions for global development programs could affect partnerships in areas like epidemiology, public health, and humanitarian innovation.

Scientific Inquiry in Energy and Climate Science

- EO 14154 (Unleashing American Energy)
 - Environmental research may be deprioritized in favor of energy production, affecting studies on renewable energy, climate resilience, and pollution impact.
 - If regulatory agencies weaken environmental protections, access to climate data, pollution tracking tools, and impact assessments may be restricted.
 - Fossil fuel research may see an increase in funding, shifting priorities in

energy-related academic programs.

National Security Considerations and Research Restrictions

- EO 14159 (Protecting Against Invasion) & EO 14161 (National Security & Public Safety Threats)
 - Increased security measures may affect visa policies for international researchers, making it harder for foreign scholars to participate in U.S.-based research.
 - Greater scrutiny on international research partnerships could limit crossborder collaborations, particularly with researchers from flagged countries.
 - Data security regulations may tighten, leading to more restrictions on sharing research in sensitive fields like artificial intelligence, biotechnology, and cybersecurity.

Institutional Changes and Academic Freedom

- EO 14207 (Eliminating the Federal Executive Institute)
 - The Federal Executive Institute, which supports leadership training for government and research institutions, is being dismantled. This could affect professional development opportunities for researchers working in government-funded programs.
 - Without this institute, there may be fewer structured pathways for leadership development in federal research agencies.
- EO 14151 & EO 14173 (Rescinding DEI & Related Hiring Policies)
 - Universities and research institutions may alter hiring and faculty recruitment policies, with less emphasis on diversity-driven faculty appointments.
 - Academic freedom may face indirect challenges if research on race, gender, or social equity becomes politically sensitive or deprioritized for funding.
 - Universities and research institutions may receive request to, "certify that it does not operate any programs promoting DEI that violate any applicable Federal anti-discrimination laws".
